From the Bimah: Our Rabbi's Message

We landed in Ben Gurion and immediately felt the mood of the

country in the airport. There is an amazing art installation of the metal 'bring them home' tags hanging where every incoming passenger will see it. Going down the hallway to passport control, the walkway is lined with pictures of the hostages. These pictures and signs in Hebrew of bring them home are everywhere. They are at bus stops, in windows on walls you can't go far without seeing them. On the cab ride from the train station in Jerusalem we learned that 24 soldiers had been killed the night before in Gaza. We passed a road leading to the Prime Minister's residence in Jerusalem that was blocked off to traffic because people had been demonstrating there 24/7 for the last few days demanding that he take action to bring the soldiers home.

Shabbat evening, January 26, Grace and I participated in a Tu B'shvat (the holiday of the birthday of the trees) seder at the home of a close friend where we are staying. Usually, this holiday is marked by picnics, tree plantings, and nature activities. Not this year. We took a beautiful 3-mile walk earlier in the day in the Tyelet Park overlooking Jerusalem and East Jerusalem. My friend asked me to think about the connection between the holiday and what is going on in Israel for our seder discussion. When we passed a beautiful carob tree we talked about the famous Talmudic story of Honi and the carob tree. As Honi was planting the tree, a passerby asked him why he was planting the tree knowing he would never see it give fruit since it takes 70 years. His response was like his ancestors before him who had planted these trees, he too was doing the same for future generations. Like Honi, the soldiers today are fighting to make sure that future generations of Israelis will continue to have a homeland while some of them will not have the luxury of living to see tomorrow. We celebrate the birthday of trees because for generations, others have planted them and we continue to plant them today. On our walk, we passed by olive trees that were hundreds of years old. If only they could talk and tell us what they have witnessed over the years.

Israel is fighting for survival. People we have spoken to, compare this period to that of the 48 war. In Jerusalem, restaurants and coffee shops are full. Life goes on but everyone is affected by this war. My rabbinic trip began in Tel Aviv on Sunday. We are a group of 40 Reform rabbis and a few spouses. I am happy to report that I have raised over \$5000 to distribute during this trip. I look forward to being able to share stories from this experience with you during my next visit. We spent a few days before the trip catching up with old friends and family. I truly feel blessed to be here at this historic moment in Jewish history. Please pray for peace in Israel.

May Israel soon know peace, and may the hostages be brought back home where they belong.

Dear TBS Family and Friends,

I spoke with Rabbi Liss and Grace who have spent the last week in Jerusalem and are now in Tel Aviv with a group of Reform rabbis. They're having some amazing experiences, and we'll get to hear about their first-hand observations -- along with photos and videos -- during our February rabbinic visit.

Jews around the world continue to grieve for the atrocities that were inflicted on October 7. And we continue to fight back against the frightening degree of antisemitism that ensued. While some of the hostages have been freed, more than 100 remain in captivity 113 days later. Until all hostages are free and the savage war we did not invite is over, I'll continue to repeat information as to sites we can visit to help our Israeli brothers and sisters.

As some of you may know, Alexis and I have been working on turning the downstairs bookshelves into a functional lending library. I'm excited to announce that the library is now open to the congregation! Our current hours are on the Sundays the Hebrew School meets from 9:30-10 and 11:30-1 or by appointment.

Our online catalog can be found at <u>https://www.librarycat.org/lib/TBSHickory</u>. As of right now, we have 113 adult books and 214 children's books ready to be checked out. I'll include updates each month on our progress as we continue to catalog books. Our collection is quite large, so we still have a good bit of work ahead of us.

Library cards are available to all synagogue members. To get a library card, please email Alexis with your first and last name, phone number, and email address. She will email you back with your Patron ID, which you can use to place holds online. Library cards will be issued at your first in-person visit to the library. All Hebrew school students, parents, and teachers have library cards ready that can be picked up at our next Hebrew school meeting if not already claimed.

Several people have asked about donating books to the library. We accept book donations if you have any you would like to re-home. We will take any Jewish books as donations, but we are especially happy to accept books geared at older children and teenagers as we do not have as many of those as we do books for younger children and academic books for adults.

Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund

The Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund (HSSF) was established by a long-time Temple member and past President, Burt Sederholm (may his memory be a blessing), to honor his late wife Harriet, who died shortly



after she retired from 25 years with the Catawba County Department of Social Services. The scholarship committee is a sub-committee of the Temple Beth Shalom Board. The committee manages funds invested to award one-time scholarships with the earnings from the invested funds. These awards honor the memory of Harriet Sederholm and her efforts to improve the lives of many impoverished adults and children in Catawba County.

The HSSF scholarship is available to students. Candidates

will submit an essay to any one of the committee members. The essay will explain who the candidate is, what they are doing currently, their plans for the future, how the scholarship funds will be used, and, if applicable, what the connection may be to Jewish life.

The committee will make decisions based on the following preferences but not absolutes:

- + Is the applicant a temple member or related to a temple member?
- + Is the applicant Jewish?
- + Will the funds be used for educational needs?
- + Will the funds make a difference regarding the applicant's ability to benefit from the activity?
- + Is the activity something deemed to be of value by the committee?

Interested students should submit their essays by April 30th. The scholarship season runs from May 1-April 30. All applicants will be notified in writing if their application has been approved or declined by May 15th. Awards should be mailed to recipients by May 31st.

The essay should be emailed to any of the committee members: Lin Gentry, Karen Ferguson, or Sandy Guttler. Naturally, the committee encourages everyone to make a tax-deductible donation to the Scholarship Fund at any time.
