From the Bimah: Our Rabbi's Message

In January, we are introduced to Moses as we begin the reading of the Book of Exodus. The story of

the Exodus is the continuation of the historical journey of the Jewish people. As we begin a new year, in a sense while we as Jews continue our journey into an unknown future, events occurring around us will become historical markers for us and the world. 2024 began with the Israeli Supreme Court striking down a law that deeply divided Israel and led to 100's of thousands of people demonstrating to preserve Israel's democracy. This action taken by the Supreme Court wipes out the potential for corruption and maintains the rule of law in Israel.

2024 is an election year in the United States and while we watched Israel from afar deal with their internal conflicts, the world will be closely watching what will happen here as we move towards the election in November.

It is with great sadness that Israel is still fighting her war for survival. While the world calls for ceasefires, I do not hear anyone calling on Gaza to stop sending rockets into Israel. No one is calling on Hezbollah to stop sending bombs from Lebanon into Israel.

At midnight on January 1st, many rockets were launched from Gaza into central Israel. While there is no apparent end in sight, the word is that Israel and Hamas are negotiating another ceasefire in exchange for the release of more hostages. We can only hope and pray that this will happen quickly.

Grace and I are flying to Israel on January 22nd. We will be joining a mission led by my rabbinic organization, the Central Conference of

American Rabbis, to volunteer; join forces with my Israeli colleagues; meet with families directly affected by the situation; and learn what is happening on the ground. One of the criteria for going on this trip is that you must be able to run. I have been to Israel too many times to count and that has never before been a condition for going on any of my trips there. The reality is if the sirens go off, they need to know that all of us can move quickly in the number of seconds we have to get to a bomb shelter or a safe room. This is today's reality and how sad is that? We have been asked to bring money to Israel to help our colleagues with the ongoing need to provide people with what they need. If anyone is interested in contributing to this please speak with me.

On a brighter note, I am so looking forward to Werner Cohn's Bar Mitzvah which is happening on January 13th. He is an outstanding student and a pleasure to work with. Please join us for his Bar Mitzvah so that you too can experience what a lovely young man he is! Mazal tov to his parents Seth and Ashley and his grandparents who I know will be kvelling the entire weekend.

I hope you will join us over Shabbat for spiritual nourishment, learning, community, and good food! I wish all of us a healthy, safe, and fulfilling New Year!

The President's Message

Dear TBS Family and Friends,

I hope this finds all of you and those dear to you enjoying a great start to 2024! While our most prominent new year is Rosh Hashanah, we Jews are fortunate to have multiple opportunities to enjoy new beginnings -- Nisan, Tu Bishvat, and the secular new year. And we can enjoy each one in its own unique way. This year begins with the greatest challenge to the Jewish people that most of us have ever known.

Last year, 2023, began with massive protests over judicial reform in Israel leading some to warn that Israel was coming close to civil war. Those protests continued until shortly after the new Jewish year. Then, on October 7, while Israelis were celebrating Shemini Atzeret, Hamas launched an attack that would kill more Jews in any single day since the Holocaust. Thus, Israel was plunging into the most devastating war in its 75-year history.

Rabbi Dr. Daniel (Danny) Gordis writes a weekly column, *Israel from the Inside*. If you haven't read it, I suggest you give it a try. In his January 1, 2024, column he wrote that, on December 26, 2022, the column was called "If you know Jewish history, Israel's being 74 years old should make you very, very nervous." He noted that the first two times that Israel was sovereign and united lasted 73 and 74 years, respectively. The attack from Hamas came just a few months after Israel celebrated its 75th birthday.

While some of the hostages have been freed, too many remain captive almost 90 days later. I'm going to repeat some information which I shared with you a couple of months ago. We can do a few things to help our Israeli brothers and sisters. Here are some sites where we can make donations:

You can also receive frequent updates on the situation in Israel from those sites. The ADL and AIPAC also provide frequent updates and offer webinars and invitations to let our elected representatives know that we stand with Israel and that we urge them to do so as well.

And don't forget our Jewish college students, many of whom are having a rough go of it on their campuses. Our campus Hillel needs our support now as well. Go to <https://www.hillel.org> to find out how you can help.

In these troubled times, it behooves us to stay informed. The Wall Street Journal (www.WSJ.com) and the New York Times (www.nytimes.com) are good sources. In addition, check out some sources that come directly from Israel. Israel from the Inside with Daniel Gordis (danielgordis.substack.com) is one of my favorites (I've been a fan for years!). The Times of Israel (<https://www.timesofisrael.com>) is another. And I'm sure Rabbi Liss will be glad to recommend her favorites.

On the Home Front:

On Saturday, December 16, Dayspring Church, Hickory, held a prayer rally for Israel led by Pastor Glenn Pinkney, for those who wanted "to honor the Biblical mandate to stand with and stand for Jerusalem/Israel." Some of you will recall that Pastor Glenn visited us during our Shabbat morning service in December and spoke about the rally. While I was unable to stay for the entire rally due to family obligations, I was honored to represent our Jewish community by singing "Hatikvah" early in the program. I was amazed when everyone stood after I read the translation and before I started singing. While so many communities are suffering from Antisemitic acts, we are blessed to enjoy a positive relationship with our non-Jewish friends and neighbors. Once again, thank you to Rabbi Dennis Jones for forging ties with the Catawba Valley Interfaith Council (CVIC). We value the friendships that have come from that undertaking and look forward to continuing them.

Your Board of Trustees has approved a letter underlining our support for Israel. That letter will be sent to all our members very soon.

We look forward to welcoming Rabbi Liss back January 12 and 13. Don't forget that she'll offer a special blessing for those whose birthdays are in the month of January. We'll also celebrate the bar mitzvah of Werner Cohn. He's pretty amazing!

I look forward to seeing you soon -- in person or via Zoom.

Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund



The Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund (HSSF) was established by a long-time Temple member and past President, Burt Sederholm (may his memory be a blessing), to honor his late wife Harriet, who died shortly after she retired from 25 years with the Catawba County Department of Social Services. The scholarship committee is a sub-committee of the Temple Beth Shalom Board. The committee manages funds invested to award one-time scholarships with the earnings from the invested funds.

These awards honor the memory of Harriet Sederholm and her efforts to improve the lives of many impoverished adults and children in Catawba County.

The HSSF scholarship is available to students. Candidates will submit an essay to any one of the committee members. The essay will explain who the candidate is, what they are doing currently, their plans for the future, how the scholarship funds will be used, and, if applicable, what the connection may be to Jewish life.

The committee will make decisions based on the following preferences but not absolutes:

- ✦ Is the applicant a temple member or related to a temple member?
- ✦ Is the applicant Jewish?
- ✦ Will the funds be used for educational needs?
- ✦ Will the funds make a difference regarding the applicant's ability to benefit from the activity?
- ✦ Is the activity something deemed to be of value by the committee?

Interested students should submit their essays by April 30th. The scholarship season runs from May 1-April 30. All applicants will be notified in writing if their application has been approved or declined by May 15th. Awards should be mailed to recipients by May 31st.

The essay should be emailed to any of the committee members: Lin Gentry, Karen Ferguson, or Sandy Guttler. Naturally, the committee encourages everyone to make a tax-deductible donation to the Scholarship Fund at any time.

The collections include key scholarly journals, thousands of books, DVDs, and rare archival materials pertaining to Jewish, Holocaust, and Peace Studies. The library also has two workstations for easy access to the USC Shoah Foundation's 55,000 survivor testimonies. It functions like a Central European Präsenzbibliothek, i.e., materials can be used on site and manually checked out inside the library.
