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# From the Bimah: Our Rabbi's Message

Friday night, Erev Sukkot was ushered in, in New York along with massive flooding and torrential

rains. Had it been a few weeks later, it would have coincided with the Torah portion, Noah! An ark would have come in handy! The Torah commands us to build sukkot, temporary shelters, and to dwell in them for 8 days as a reminder of our ancestors' temporary dwellings for 40 years as they wandered in the Sinai desert. A sukkah by design is a very flimsy structure. You must be able to see the stars through the top of it. It is not meant to be permanent or sturdy. The structure reminds us of the fragility of life and how fortunate we are to have shelter, food, and a community to share our lives within times of need and joy. We are truly blessed but not everyone can say this. One out of 6 children in America is hungry and does not have enough food daily. Over 600,000 people in this country do not have permanent housing. Most shelters are closed during the daytime and open in the evenings. Where do people go when it is pouring down rain? Our sukkah reminds us of our responsibilities as Jews to help make this world a better place for everyone. It reminds us that the majority of Americans live from paycheck to paycheck and have little to no savings. Any slight change can put people out in the street. While we count our blessings, we are obligated to help those in need.

We just finished our first High Holy Days together. Grace and I are so grateful to be part of this community. I want to thank everyone who did their part to help make the holiday experience a meaningful one for everyone, from the people who opened the building to those who stayed and cleaned up after all of us and locked the doors. A special shout-out again to our Security team. A special thank you to Susan for singing, and to Jeff and Grace, and Dennis and Kathy Jones for blowing shofar. Thank you to all of our readers, to Rachael for her tech help, to Aaron and Mary Lee Tosky, and Linda Greenfield for their home hospitality, and to Jodi and Rhett and Sheri and St. John for hosting us for holiday meals. The beauty of being in a small community is seeing how congregants come together to make things happen. I am very impressed with the commitment and dedication of the leaders of this congregation and of all the members who work to see this congregation grow and thrive.

A number of people mentioned to me over the holidays that they do not feel that the synagogue is an open, welcoming community and they want to change this. Every community prides itself on being warm and welcoming. Years ago, our New York Regional Director of the Reform Movement gave us a challenge to see how warm and welcoming our synagogues really are. She challenged us to look at our congregations and see how members interact with one another and with visitors coming to services and programs. So, I ask you the following questions: do you welcome the stranger? Do you talk to people you don't know? Do you go out of your way to sit with people who are alone? Do you invite people to sit with you during temple meals? Do you introduce yourself to unfamiliar faces? Do you consider Temple Beth Shalom to be a warm and welcoming congregation? I will be back on the weekend of the 13<sup>th</sup>. I look forward to seeing you over the course of the weekend. For our Saturday Havdalah program, I will be teaching texts about Derech Eretz which is behavior that is acceptable in society and is geared toward making people happy, as is written in the Mishna, "Which is the proper path one should choose? One that is pleasing to the one who performs it and is pleasing to others (Avot 2:1). The material is fascinating, and I hope you will join me.

# Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund



The Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund (HSSF) was established by a long-time Temple member and past President, Burt Sederholm (may his memory be a blessing), to honor his late wife Harriet, who died shortly after her retirement from 25 years with the Catawba County Department of Social Services. The scholarship committee is a sub-committee of the Temple Beth Shalom Board. The committee manages funds invested for the purpose of awarding one-time scholarships with the

earnings from the invested funds. These awards honor the memory of Harriet Sederholm and her efforts to improve the lives of so many impoverished adults and children in Catawba County.

The HSSF scholarship is available to students. Candidates will submit an essay to any one of the committee members. The essay will explain who the candidate is, what they are doing currently, their plans for the future, how the scholarship funds will be used, and, if applicable, what the connection may be to Jewish life.

The committee will make decisions based on the following preferences but not absolutes:

- + Is the applicant a temple member or related to a temple member?
- + Is the applicant Jewish?
- + Will the funds be used for educational needs?
- + Will the funds make a difference regarding the applicant's ability to benefit from the activity?
- + Is the activity something deemed to be of value by the committee?


Interested students should submit their essays by April 30th. The scholarship season runs from May 1-April 30. All applicants will be notified in writing if their application has been approved or declined by May 15<sup>th</sup>. Awards should be mailed to recipients by May 31st.
