From the Bimah: Our Rabbi's Message

I wrote this article on Tisha B'av from Jaffa where we arrived after spending 4 days in Jerusalem. Tisha B'av commemorates the destruction of the First and Second Temple in Jerusalem traditionally attributed to senseless hatred between Jews. On Tisha B'av it is customary to fast and read the Book of Lamentations. Lamentations laments the destruction and the wanton behavior of the Jews living in that period. The parallels between those times and today once again sadly show us the timelessness of our

Biblical texts and how human nature does not change. For 3½ years Israelis have been going to weekly protests. For 10 months over the horrible judicial reforms that the current government was trying to put through, and then following October 7th, the protests were against the war in Gaza and wanting the hostages to be freed. This Shabbat, Hamas released pictures of two hostages who are so emaciated that they look like Holocaust victims, one being forced to dig a grave in the tunnel presumably for himself. Hamas stated that they are getting the same food as the Palestinians. From what we saw, there is no way these men are going to survive without being released immediately. Yet, we face a government whose majority coalition does not care. The opposition is screaming, and the majority of Israelis are screaming yet the ruling coalition cares more about staying in power, not

having to take responsibility for the intelligence failures, and keeping Bibi out of jail all over the lives of the hostages. Today is day 667 in captivity. It is heartbreaking. The senseless hatred between Jews in Israel is played out every single day in Israel where the pleas to end the starvation and the war in Gaza fall on deaf ears. This is not a story that will end well.

I am involved in a weeklong seminar on Crisis and Creativity, and I will have much to share with you over the next several months. I look forward to our next visit to Hickory beginning on August 15th.

May you continue to enjoy your summer!

Remember that only 5% of donations for food insecurity come from the private sector! Let's continue to take "leaps of action" by donating our cans/boxes to the Hickory Soup Kitchen. We look forward to gathering again for services with Rabbi Liss on Friday evening, August 15 at 7:00 and Saturday morning, August 16, at 10:00, followed by kiddush lunch. Don't forget adult Jewish learning/seudah shlisheet (bring a parve or dairy dish to share) and Havdallah at 6:00pm. If you have an interest in having Rabbi Liss stay at your home for Shabbat dinner, and/or stay at your home for a Rabbi weekend, please reach out to a board member.

And Israel's challenges continue. We are grateful that some hostages have been released, and we continue to pray that our remaining **20 hostages**, held more than **670 days**, will be released soon. We pray for the families who await their loved ones' return and for those who have received the bodies of their deceased.

We continue to pay attention to and support Hillel as it gives Jewish college students a place to feel safe in their Judaism. Until all hostages are free and the savage war we did not invite is over, I'll continue to repeat information as to sites we can visit to help our Israeli brothers and sisters and our college students.

The Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund



The Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund (HSSF) was established by a long-time Temple member and past President, Burt Sederholm (may his memory be a blessing), to honor his late wife Harriet, who died shortly after she retired from 25 years with the Catawba County Department of Social Services. The scholarship committee is a sub-committee of the Temple Beth Shalom Board. The committee manages funds invested to award one-time scholarships with the earnings from the invested funds. These awards honor the memory of Harriet Sederholm and her efforts to improve the lives of many impoverished adults and children in Catawba County.

The HSSF scholarship is available to students. Candidates will submit an essay to any one of the committee members. The essay will explain who the candidate is, what they are doing currently, their plans for the future, how the scholarship funds will be used, and, if applicable, what the connection may be to Jewish life.

The committee will make decisions based on the following preferences but not absolutes:

- Is the applicant a temple member or related to a temple member?
- Is the applicant Jewish?
- Will the funds be used for educational needs?
- Will the funds make a difference regarding the applicant's ability to benefit from the activity?
- Is the activity something deemed to be of value by the committee?

Interested students should submit their essays by April 30th. The scholarship season runs from May 1-April 30. All applicants will be notified in writing if their application has been approved or declined by May 15th. Awards should be mailed to recipients by May 31st.

The essay should be emailed to any of the committee members: Lin Gentry, Karen Ferguson, or Sandy Guttler. Naturally, the committee encourages everyone to make a tax-deductible donation to the Scholarship Fund at any time.


